

June 1, 2016

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session in the office of the Commissioners with Chairman Dave Reinhardt, members Bruce H. Peterson and Paul Tweten, and Recording Secretary Ruth Dowell present.

René Clampitt, Planner/911/GIS Supervisor, stopped in to discuss plats with Commissioner Tweten.

Albert Fehler came in to let us know that he is interested in being on the Opheim Cemetery District Board.

Tara Hicks, Nemont Telephone, came in to extend a formal invitation to the Nemont Telephone Cooperative preconstruction meeting at 1:00 p.m. on June 20, 2016.

Robert Kompel, City of Glasgow Public Works Director, stopped in to visit with the Commissioners about the Magruder property. Mr. Kompel stated that he is working on a mitigation plan for the City to present to the Council based on the report from Bob Waller.

Commissioner Peterson asked if this would be opposed by Pete Hellend.

Mr. Kompel said that the Council needs to understand they may have to go against counsel.

Commissioner Tweten stated there isn't really any liability with the Super Fund.

Mr. Kompel said the mitigation plan should give the Council some level of comfort.

As pertaining to East Court, they are on schedule to start in mid June. They are working with Curt Bass, Century Companies Inc.

Commissioner Peterson asked if there is a drainage problem on East Court.

Mr. Kompel said that it is a little off, but they have allowed for undercut in the bid on the road.

Discussion followed concerning the price of hot mix. Mr. Kompel will email the Commissioners with the price.

Robert Kompel left the office.

Chairman Reinhardt began Discussion and Decision at 10:30 a.m.

Stan Ozark, KLTZ/Mix 93, joined the meeting.

Parker Kulczyk, Glasgow Courier, joined the meeting.

There were no additions or deletions to the agenda, and there was no public comment.

The first actionable item on the agenda was employment/termination notices.

The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and passed unanimously.*

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten authorizing the Chairman to execute a Notice of Employment Change for Jesse Vaughan, as a permanent Detention Officer, working full-time, beginning May 19, 2016 at \$14.43 per hour. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and passed unanimously.*

The next item on the agenda was appointing a Fire Warden for 2016-2017.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten to appoint Dan Carney to continue as the Fire Warden for the next year, July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it passed.*

Next on the agenda was the personnel policy for Valley County.

Commissioner Tweten stated that some of the personnel policy needs to be rewritten.

Chairman Reinhardt suggested that we might want to postpone discussion on the personnel policy.

Commissioner Peterson stated that we should have some input from Department Heads on reviewing the personnel policy.

It was determined that Chairman Reinhardt, Commissioner Peterson, Commissioner Tweten, Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, and René Clampitt, Planner/911/GIS Supervisor, will review the policy.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten to postpone implementing a new personnel policy until June 15, 2016 to allow time to review. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and passed unanimously.*

Next on the agenda was the DUI task force contract.

*Commissioner Peterson made a motion authorizing the Chairman to sign the DUI task force contract. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

The Right-of-Way Application submitted by Nemont was the final item on the agenda.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten authorizing the Chairman to execute an Application and Permit to Use Right-of-Way No. 689, between Valley County and Nemont Telephone Coop., for a road bore, to run fiber optic line parallel to Happy Flats road,, located in Section 04, Township 30 North, Range 35 East. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it unanimously passed. The said Document, No. 158178, was filed in the office of the Clerk and Recorder on June 06, 2016.*

Colleen Pankratz, Valley County Transit Supervisor, came in to discuss transit issues. Ms. Pankratz states that ridership is down from 70,000 to 60,000 rides, and she does not know whether it is due to decreased gas prices, customer vehicle ownership, or market saturation. Discussion continued concerning monthly safety meetings at the Transit office. Currently drivers who live out of town are not required to come to the safety meetings due to the expense incurred coming to a half hour meeting. It was determined that safety meetings are important and maybe attendees could be paid a minimum of one hours wage to attend the meeting instead of just signing the minutes from the meeting.

Commissioner Peterson suggested videotaping the meeting and having it mandatory to watch the tape during scheduled work hours.

Ms. Pankratz likes having the live input from the employees when they have their safety meetings.

Commissioner Tweten recommended having employees run the safety meetings, deciding what they want to discuss and leading the meeting.

Ms. Pankratz thought that was a good idea and that maybe whomever is running the meeting could determine what day they wanted to have the meeting held.

Colleen Pankratz, Valley County Transit Supervisor, presented the Commissioners with a capital contract to purchase a minivan for Valley County Transit. The total cost of the project is \$30,768.89. Valley County has a 13.42% local match obligation of \$3,771.02.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson authorizing the Chairman to sign capital contract #108978 between the State of Montana Department of Transportation and Valley County Transit. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously*

Todd Young, Valley County Road Supervisor, came in to discuss various road issues.

Chairman Reinhardt met with Mark Sullivan, Fish, Wildlife and Parks, to discuss cleaning out Antelope Creek from Billingsly Road to the railroad tracks.


Chairman Reinhardt spoke with Cole Peebles concerning the sidewalk at Opheim. A curb stop was covered with concrete and needs to be cut out.

Mike Hughes, Glasgow Job Service, dropped by to discuss various issues with the Commissioners.


Mike Bain, Valley County Computer Technician, came in for his budget review.


Connie Boreson, Valley County Health Department Supervisor, came in to discuss her budget for fiscal year 2016-17.

Kari Knierim, Valley County Landfill, will take the bid to the Refuse Disposal District Board to be voted on June 21, 2016.







Ms. Crandell said that the reduced hours would be fine, there aren't any sports tournaments that need additional police hours.

Mr. St. John agreed that there is not much activity requiring the police.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, stated that the reduction in hours required by Opheim would help the Sheriff's Department focus some of their time elsewhere.

Commissioner Peterson stated that he is in agreement, and would like time to ponder the change.

The discussion moved forward to discuss the water issues in Opheim.

Ms Crandell stated that they need \$35,000 to paint the water tower due to Coliform issues they believe have been traced back to the tower. The town of Opheim took out a loan last year for a bubble tower.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, asked what is the term on the bubble tower loan.

Michael Roberton replied that it is a 15 year loan.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, suggested that the town of Opheim look into getting grants to help with the water situation.

Commissioner Peterson asked if they had talked to Great Northern Development.

Ms. Crandell stated that they had not talked to Great Northern Development.

Chairman Reinhardt asked if they had looked at Treasure State Endowment Program (TSEP).

Mr. St. John stated that Great West Energy is looking at TSEP.

Chairman Reinhardt stated that if you Opheim disincorporates they will have to make a water/sewer district like Hinsdale did.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, reiterated that for help with the water system, Opheim should check with Great Northern.

Commissioner Tweten stated that Great West Energy might be good as well.

Ms. Crandall stated that Opheim can pull through if the painting of the tower takes care of the water problem, but they will not pull through if the water issue goes further.

Commissioner Peterson was wondering how much citizens of Opheim are paying for water and sewer.

Ms Crandall stated that they are paying \$66 for water, and \$15 for sewer.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, stated that with unincorporation, Opheim will not have access to 1033 equipment they currently have available to them.

Ms Crandell, Mr. St. John, and Mr. Roberton were in agreement that the goal is to have Opheim stay incorporated.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, asked if the speed sign outside of Opheim is helping.

Ms. Crandall stated that yes, the sign is helping.

he meeting concerning Opheim adjourned.

Lucas Locke, Airport Manager, Board members, Kristie Brabeck and Darrell Morehouse met with the Commissioners concerning paving areas near the hangers at the airport.

There has been some push back from hanger owners over the request to have them pay for paving up to their hangers.

Commissioner Tweten stated that if he had a hanger at the airport he would feel some responsibility to maintain the property.

Various options for paving or cementing the property were discussed.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the Airport Board wanted Valley County to pick up the approximately \$2,000 tab to have the areas in front of the hangers paved.

Lucas Locke, Airport Manager, said yes.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten authorizing the Chairman to pay up to \$2,000 in Local Option Tax to pave in front of the hangers at the airport. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and passed unanimously.*

Lucas Locke, Airport Manager, Kristie Brabeck, and Darrell Morehouse left the office.

David Evans and Kayla Criscuolo, Compliance Specialists, Safe & Health Bureau, from the Montana Department of Labor & Industry stopped by on their way to inspect the Valley County Road Shop. Valley County Safety Coordinator, Nancy Hamilton, was unavailable due to work responsibilities in Scobey, Montana. The Compliance Specialists contact at the Road Shop will be Dillon Collins. Mr. Evans stated that he will have his report done within two weeks, and he will forward it to Ms. Hamilton and Mr. Collins at that time. If there are any issues, the Montana Department of Labor & Industry will give Valley County thirty days to fix them.


Jack Schye stopped by to discuss various issues.

**June 29, 2016**

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session in the office of the Commissioners with Chairman Dave Reinhardt, members Bruce H. Peterson and Paul Tweten, and Recording Secretary Ruth Dowell present.

Nancy Hamilton, Safety Coordinator, stopped in to discuss various safety topics.

Vicky Wetz, Council on Aging (COA) Supervisor, stopped to discuss various issues with the Commissioners.

Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, stopped to discuss various issues.

Todd Young, Valley County Road Supervisor, dropped in to discuss what is going on with the Road Department.

Rick Seiler, Valley County DES Coordinator, dropped off the Emergency Operations Plan for Valley County including the City of Glasgow and the Towns of Fort Peck, Opheim, Nashua, and all unincorporated communities.

Chairman Reinhardt began Discussion and Decision at 10:30 a.m.

Stan Ozark, KLTZ/Mix 93, joined the meeting.

Added to the agenda was the proposal to hire a Nurse Assistant for the Valley County Detention Center. Also added was the Opheim Law Enforcement contract.

There was no public comment submitted.

The first actionable item on the agenda was employment/termination notices.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson authorizing the Chairman to execute a Notice of Accounting Change for Chad Matthew Remmich, as a short term Chief Deputy, at 90% of the Sheriff's salary, with funding coming from the Fort Peck Contract, for two days, beginning June 11, 2016 through June 12, 2016. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

Next on the agenda was the adoption of Safety Policies: Lockout/Tag out, Blood Borne Pathogens, and Hazard Communication from Nancy Hamilton, Safety Coordinator.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten authorizing the Chairman to adopt the following safety policies: Lockout/Tag out, Blood Borne Pathogens, and Hazard Communication. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and passed unanimously.*

The Law Enforcement Interlocal Agreements for the Towns of Nashua, Fort Peck, and Opheim and the Memorandum of Understanding Amendment 2016 between Valley County and Blaine County were next on the agenda.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson directing the Chairman to sign the Interlocal Agreement between the Valley County Sheriff's and the Town of Nashua to provide 832 hours of general law enforcement services to the town at a cost of \$20,868.00, beginning July 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson directing the Chairman to sign the Interlocal Agreement between the Valley County Sheriff's and the Town of Fort Peck to provide 832 hours of general law enforcement services to the town at a cost of \$20,868.00, beginning July 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson directing the Chairman to sign the Interlocal Agreement between the Valley County Sheriff's and the Town of Opheim to provide 312 hours of general law enforcement services to the town at a cost of \$7,800.00, beginning July 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson directing the Chairman to sign the Memorandum of Understanding Amendment 2016 between Valley County and Blaine County with Valley County agreeing to rent one pod capable of housing 8 prisoners in the Valley County Detention Center for the sum of \$425.00 per day effective July 1, 2016. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

The next item on the agenda was the Right-of-Way application from YDOC LAND AND LIVESTOCK LLC to install two 24" wire cattle guards on County Road 141 between mile markers 516 and 517.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten authorizing the Chairman to execute an Application and Permit #690 to Use Right-of-Way between Valley County and YDOC LAND & LIVESTOCK LLC, for the installation of two cattle guards on County Road 141, located in Township 28 North, Range 43 East, S16, NW1/4 and S17 SE 1/4. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it passed unanimously.*

The next item on the agenda was health services for the Valley County Detention Center.

Commissioner Peterson stated that the Sheriff would like to hire a Nurse Assistant who is able to prescribe medications. The Sheriff has been in contact with a potential candidate who would be willing to work for the Valley County Detention Center on Tuesdays. Glen Meier, Valley County Sheriff, contacted other counties and they would be willing to hire the Nurse Assistant on a job share schedule. The potential candidate would be able to see five to six patients on the day she is in Glasgow.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson directing the Chairman to sign a one month trial agreement between Valley County and the Nurse Assistant effective July 1, 2016. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

The final item on the agenda was the contract for law enforcement between Valley County and the Town of Opheim. As per conversation on June 28, 2016, the Town of Opheim would like to change this year's Interlocal Agreements for the Town of Opheim to reflect 312 hours of general law enforcement services to the town.

*A motion was made by Commissioner Tweten authorizing the Chairman to inform the Town of Opheim and the Valley County Sheriff's office that the Commissioners are in agreement of the new arrangement. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tweten and passed unanimously.*

*A motion was made by Commissioner Peterson, seconded by Commissioner Tweten and carried, to authorize the Chairman to execute the following Pledged Securities:*
